This means that next year will mark the 125th Anniversary of our house of worship. We have begun to make plans for the celebration, but many of the details require further consideration. Here is what is in the works for 2015:



Sunday, April 26: <u>125th Anniversary Celebration</u>. Believe it or not, our guest preacher on this day will be our Primate, the Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church, The Most Rev. Dr. Katharine Jefferts Schori. This will be a big day with a ton of energy and excitement.

Wednesday, May 6: The Brown Family and the Creation of the Foreside. This will be an amazing historical presentation by Earle Shettleworth, Jr. who serves as the Maine State Archivist.

Sunday, May 17: A Day of Service and Goodness. To emphasize our primary and original purpose of blessing the community around us, we are planning a day of outreach service activities for the entire parish.

Saturday, June 13: <u>Founders Day Picnic.</u> A fun celebration for all ages with special music, games, and lots of food. God willing and weather permitting, this will be outside on our lawns.

The initial impetus behind our beloved community known as Saint Mary's was the tragic death of Alida Greely Brown on April 25, 1889. By God's grace, the Brown family allowed this sadness to inspire the creation of a new community which has been a blessing to so many over the last 125 years. Throughout next year, we will be inviting each of you to join the **Alida Greely Brown Heritage Society** by including Saint Mary's in your financial planning. "Mindful Movement and Breath Series"

Returns by Popular Demand on September 15th Again offered to the Community at large at NO cost

Beginning on September 15th, enjoy a 6 week class on Mondays from 9-9:45 that seeks to connect the body, mind and spirit. Each class is structured around a universal meditation/intention, threading quiet movement and breath through a musical journey designed to create space and drops each participant more deeply into themselves. The movements may be done from a chair or the floor, so are suitable to all ages and physical abilities.



This class is offered to S. Marians and the greater community at NO cost. Just as "Souper Supper" helps to feed the body, so this class will help feed the soul. What a great way to start your work-week! Invite your friends and colleagues!

This program was first offered in June and proved to be exceedingly popular. The class will again be led by Kathleen Savoy. A happy transplant to Maine from New York City, Kathleen comes from Sonic Yoga. Kathleen layers thought, breath, music, metaphor and mudra into the movement and to the sacred practice of yoga. She creates the space for each individual to take a journey in every class while moving as a collective and to find the deepening of their desired outcome through an empowering and balanced practice. Kathleen brings her knowledge of the physical body and her understanding of mind/body connection to every class.

Vestry Highlights for August

The vestry meeting kicked off with an update from Janet Bowne, chair of the Annual Stewardship Campaign. Janet said to date we have received 149 pledges for a total of \$255,000 for an average pledge of \$1712. Our budget for 2014 calls for \$260,000 in pledges so we are still a little short and urge anyone who has not pledged to do so now to help us reach the budget goal. Please keep in mind that the budget for 2014 has a significant deficit. Recognizing that we can't continue with deficit budgets, efforts are underway to enhance our stewardship efforts for 2015 and another careful review of expenditures as the 2015 budget is developed.



The Budget & Finance Committee (BFC) attended the meeting seeking information about plans for 2015 as members start the process for developing the budget for 2015. We discussed stewardship planning, acceptable deficit levels and salary increases among other topics. As in the past, the BFC will meet with various committee/guild chairs to review expenses for the coming year. The BFC will develop a draft budget for review by the vestry in September. We are very fortunate to have a talented committee working on financial issues.

Becky Pride, chair of the nominating committee, reported great progress in finding candidates for the will begin to find representatives to attend the diocesan convention for 2015.

The vestry continued its work on Vision 2014, finalizing the three key vision statements. Using the feedback we have received from the parish and our own discussions, Father Nathan will list action steps supporting each statement for our review at our September meeting. Our plan is to have 3-5 specific action steps we will focus on in the coming five years.

Adopt a Bed



A most gorgeous Maine summer may be coming to a close, but Guiding RAY will be taking off with excitement and enthusiasm! Our Guiding RAY teachers can't wait to greet and register our youngest parishioners on September 7th, to kick off a new year of Godly Play....and celebrate our "homecoming" with picnic and carnival following the 10am service! Registration for all will begin this Sunday at 9:45 in front of the Guild Room, directly following Family Chapel at 9:30.



The Schedule: This year our Sunday program will begin 15 minutes later: 9:30am: Family Chapel with Father Nathan in the Father James Chapel

9:45am: Guiding RAY begins

10:40 am: Children (except nursery) escorted to Church for the Eucharist

The Substance: As we begin our second year of Godly Play, you will find that while the subject material is the same, the stories for our older children will delve more deeply into the story than those they experienced last year. To further keep their experience fresh and interesting, one Sunday most months will be devoted to music, outreach or other faith-based activity for all of our students.

Our Godly Play Lessons in September

The Holy Family and Circle of the Church Year. These two stories will set the tone for our year in the Godly Play Classroom. We learn how the Church tells time in color, and work with the calendar which will guides our liturgical year together. Our Holy Family story holds significance for the entire cycle of Godly Play lessons. It is the story of the re-creation of the universe through Christ's incarnation that changes everything; most especially, it changes the way we understand ourselves, each other, the Creator and the created world around us.

Creation: In the story of creation, we begin to trace God's elusive presence with God's People. In the Godly Play presentation, children see the seven days of creation illustrated on a series of seven cards, laid out one by one.

The Flood and the Ark: With the people of God, we move from the story of creation to the re-creation of the world. God's promise to Noah, to God's family and to us that God will never again destroy the world with a flood. In the Godly Play presentation, children watch as the rains fall and the waters rise, while God keeps Noah and his family safe on the ark.

The Ten Best Ways: We continue to witness God's presence with his people on three occasions at Mt. Sinai: First, in the burning bush when God revealed to Moses the name of God. Second, when God gave the Ten Commandments to the people through Moses; and third, when, after breaking the tablets in anger, Moses climbed up Sinai to receive the Ten Commandments a second time.

One of Haiti's Institution Univers students comes to Maine

A connection between Haiti and Maine began more than a decade ago and Saint Mary's became a part of that connection in with a partnership with Saint Matthias Church. In 2011, after many years of supporting education in Haiti, Becky Pride and Kelly Weiss-Ianno went to teach at Institution Univers in Ouanaminthe, Haiti. It was at this time that they met Dan-Herley Mathieu for the first time as he was a student studying to take his TOEFL exams as he hoped to come to college in the United States. Since that trip, our concentration and our funding has shifted to Instituion Univers. Becky, Kelly, and Bruce Fithian made a second mission trip to Haiti in the fall 2013 and again, the school and the Haitian students made a enormous impact on our missioners.

There are other students whom they knew who are attending colleges in Kentucky, Ohio and Pennsylvania, but Dan is the first to come to Maine. Dan-Herley is realizing his dream and is studying at Southern Maine Community College in So Portland; he plans to become a dentist and return to serve the people of Haiti. He met up with Becky and Doug on Sunday, August 24th; not only did Dan come to church , he worked at Preble Street Soup Kitchen saying, "It makes God happy when we help others in need."


